Speech:

Tish Nicoll LGSM,DipCe, FESB,MSTSD

Born in Aberdeen, Scotland, Tish is a Licentiate of The Guildhall School of Music and Drama. She has a wide range of experience in teaching all age groups in schools, colleges and the business world. Tish now lives in Suffolk, and works freelance. She is visiting lecturer in Vocal Communications in colleges in the UK and in Italy. She has examined for The English Speaking Board (International) Ltd. and was their Chief Examiner for seven years. She has travelled widely both in the UK and overseas lecturing, running workshops, examining and adjudicating.

As well as 'Voice Over' work for advertising, Tish has television experience as a performer and stage experience as a performer and director. She is also a trained singer, specialising in recitals of poetry and song.

From an early age Tish took part in Festivals and well remembers how it feels to be a participant! Now, herself a Festival organiser and adjudicator, she knows the importance of these events and welcomes the opportunities offered to performers of all ages, giving them a platform for their work and a chance to celebrate music, poetry and drama.

Vocal, Brass, Choirs, Instrumental:

Roy Robinson MA, Dip Perf RCM, ARCM (P), LTCL (P), ARCM (T), LRAM (T), ALCM (P), ATCL (P) Roy trained as a viola and piano performer at the Royal College of Music and was a major prize-winner in his 4th year of study. He was a dual first study viola pupil of Frederick Riddle and piano pupil of Angus Morrison, and holds a complete suite of performing and teaching diplomas on those instruments. He also gained a performing diploma on violin, won the Leslie Alexander Viola Competition (the highest award available at the RCM) and was later awarded an MA; he also has a background as an organist, conductor and composer.

Roy has spent most of his career combining teaching (largely as Director of Music in independent

schools), performing, examining and adjudicating. He has taught academic music to A Level, his main instruments to diploma level and violin to RAM Exhibitioners. He has coached numerous orchestral and singing courses and festivals for children, trained and directed choral societies and has a number of published compositions for violin and small jazz groups.

He has performed in orchestras and ensembles, and as an accompanist and solo/duo recitalist. He is an extremely busy ABRSM grade, diploma and jazz examiner and has worked extensively overseas: Malaysia, Hong Kong, Qatar, Jordan, South Africa, Namibia, USA, Bermuda, China and Germany (examining in German!). He recently consulted for ABRSM by selecting and co-selecting the current graded exam syllabus for viola; he has also presented teacher meetings abroad.

As an adjudicating member and mentor for the British and International Federation of Festivals, Roy is in demand at some of the UK's largest music festivals. He not only enjoys adjudicating his specialist areas but also the complete range of classes as a generalist.

Away from music, Roy can often be found driving one of his classic cars, gardening, playing croquet or baking cakes!

Gala Festival Concert

Following the final afternoon session of the Festival on Saturday, 4th March, a Gala Festival Concert will be held in Wadebridge Town Hall at 7.00pm. Distinguished participants from all sections of the 2023 Festival will be invited to perform, creating an exciting finale to this year's event. If possible, performers are asked to keep Saturday evening free in case they are invited to take part.

Overall Trophies

The Wadebridge Choral Society Shield will be awarded to the instrumentalist considered by the Adjudicator to be the Wadebridge Festival Instrumentalist of the year.

The Daisy Rowe Memorial Trophy. Awarded to the vocalist considered by the Adjudicator to be the Wadebridge Festival Singer of the Year.

The Chrissie Clements Rose Bowl will be awarded to the female with the highest mark in the Vocal Classes.

The Clifton Gilbert Cup will be awarded to the male with the highest mark in the Vocal Classes.

The June Holmes Memorial Trophy will be awarded to the competitor with the highest mark in the Speech Classes

The Joyce Buse Memorial Trophy will be awarded to the competitor with the highest mark in the Piano Classes

Trophies, where appropriate, will be awarded to the competitor with the highest mark (minimum 81) in certain classes.

Junior Medals will be awarded to First, second and third prize winners in all 18 years and under categories.

Regulations: Please Read Carefully.

Any queries, please contact the Entry Secretary.

Eligibility:

- 1. Where an age limit is given, it will be as of 27th February 2023
- 2. Competitors in all classes must be amateur (an amateur is considered to be one who does not derive the main part of his/her income from that section of the art in which he/she is proposing to enter the Festival). Choral Classes: a professional may conduct in all classes as necessary.
- 3. No test pieces chosen for the 2020 or 2022 Festival may be offered. The Adjudicator's decision shall be final in all matters relating to the performance and content of the entry. Competitors are asked to check carefully the eligibility of their *Own Choice* and to acknowledge that the quality of choice will be considered by the Adjudicator.
- 4. Competitors in Duet/Trio/Quartet Classes must perform separate parts.
- 5. Competitors can be accepted in more than one class in solo, duet, trio, quartet, or ensemble classes only if they offer a different composition for each entry.
- 6. Songs from musical theatre can only be performed in the designated classes
- 7. Competitors who enter Classes where grades are indicated may perform in only one class per instrument and the pieces chosen must be appropriate to that grade. Competitors may not enter a class lower than the grade they have achieved. This applies to both players in Duet Classes.
- 8. Entries in the composition classes, including any poem or story, must be the competitor's own original work and be performed at the Festival. A copy for the Adjudicator, with the entry fee and reply postage of £2.00, must be sent to the Entry Secretary by Monday, 16th January, 2023.

Own Choice:

- Own Choice items must not exceed 5 minutes' duration unless otherwise stated in class reference.
 Performances exceeding the time limit (where stipulated) will be adjudicated but not marked.
- 10. The title and author/composer of *Own Choice* pieces must be clearly announced by all competitors.
- 11. Own Choice songs should be appropriate to the age of the competitor.
- 12. A copy of *Own Choice* items, clearly marked with the competitor's name and the number of the class entered, must be provided for the Adjudicator and placed in the box provided in the entrance foyer at least 30 minutes before the start of the class.
 - Please refer to Copyright and Performing Rights, Section 1, on Page 7.

Accompanists:

- 13. If required, competitors must provide their own accompanist. (Accompanist's fees are not included in the Entry Fee. See page 4).
- 14. Competitors may use a Compact Disc or recording for accompaniment provided that the part of the solo instrument is not included on the CD. All equipment must be provided.

Adjudication:

15. No competitor, teacher, or parent may speak to the Adjudicator before the start of any session.

- 16. The top three competitors in each class will be publicly adjudicated. All other marks will be announced with general comments only. Adjudication Sheets and Certificates may be obtained gratis, but must be collected from the Secretaries after adjudication. They will not be posted to competitors after the Festival.
- 17. Certificates will be awarded in all classes. Medals for Under 18 Classes and Trophies, where appropriate, will only be awarded to first prize winners with a mark of 81 or more.
- 18. In the event of a competitor being unable to compete at the time of the class as shown in the programme, the Adjudicator may, if an alternative opportunity arises, comment on the performance, but will not award any marks.

Administration

- 19. Entries may be made online at: wadebridgefestivalofmusicandspeech.com, by email or post and must be received by the Entry Secretary no later than Monday, 16th January, 2023. Entries will not be accepted unless the entrance fee is paid by Monday, 30th January, 2023. No refund for withdrawal will be made after this date. Entry fees may be paid by direct transfer/payment to the Festival's account at Barclays Bank plc Sort Code 20 74 20 Account number 40922455 quoting the entrant's surname as the reference. Alternatively, cheques should be made payable to Wadebridge Music Festival. Please advise the Entry Secretary on the entry form of the chosen payment method by ticking Y/N as appropriate.
- 20. Entry Fees are shown on page 3.
- 21. All communications requiring a reply must be accompanied by a stamped addressed envelope, unless by email to the Entry Secretary.
- 22. The Committee reserves the right to cancel or combine classes as necessary.
- 23. Should a class be timed for a period during which the competitor is likely to be at school, the parents are asked to seek the co-operation of the head teacher.
- 24. The Committee requires the return of all Festival Trophies awarded in the 2022 Festival, (unless previously returned) by Monday, January 16th, 2023. Engraving is optional and at the competitor's own expense. Please return all trophies to *Mrs Jill Nute of Homebound, Gonvena Hill, Wadebridge PL27 6DH tel:* 01208 895559
- 25. Times shown will be approximate. Competitors should be in the hall at least 30 minutes before the commencement of the class. Competitors not present when their names are called may forfeit their right to compete.
- 26. The Committee would appreciate early notification if any member of a team or group is replaced because of sickness.
- 27. All classes are now open to all genders with the exception of classes 59 and 60 (Ladies and male voice choirs)
- 28. Competitors are requested to provide their own music stands.

Copyright And Performing Rights: Important!

- 1. Competitors are advised to secure their music as soon as possible. Due to the Copyright Act, no unauthorised photo-copies are permissible, with the following exception: when an Own Choice work is selected from a publication containing several different works, and is not published separately, one copy may be made for the use of the Adjudicator, provided that the competitor has already purchased his/ her own copy. The copy must be retained and destroyed by the administrator of the Festival immediately after the event. Should an extended photocopy be used by the performer to avoid page turning, the original score should be available if the Adjudicator wishes to see it.
- 2. The Festival has entered into an agreement with the Authors' Licensing and Collecting Society. means that entrants do not have to seek copyright permission for any poetry or prose performed. Authors will be directly reimbursed as a consequence of their works being performed at this Festival.
- 3. To comply with Performing Rights competitors are asked to announce the title of their piece and the name of the composer/writer.
- 4. No one may take photographs or make video recordings during the Festival with the exception of the Festival's Official Photographer.

Wadebridge Festival Of Music And Speech – Child Protection Policy

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech work for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.
- The purpose of the policy:
- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm
- We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:
- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and $\frac{1}{2}$

volunteers

- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create Safer Festivals for everyone:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival. Name: *Ann Jones*
- 3. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection leaflets, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new Festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending / performing at a Federation Festival.
- 5. All Festival personnel wear an official badge. All teachers/parents/guardians / carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition, we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing areas that may be provided. The Festival cannot take responsibility for any property left unattended. Please note all accompanying adults will be required to pay an admission fee.
- 7. No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording of children and young people is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 8. Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival Secretary prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks, wherever possible, to meet these needs, but must know beforehand in order to prepare support, or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.

9. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus and Programme. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.
